COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

- High humidity in the church sanctuary is causing problems with the organ. It has gotten badly out of tune. The humidity is resulting from rainwater getting under the sanctuary, apparently from the area where the old part of the building joins the newer part (sanctuary and choir rooms). A solution to the problem will involve sump pumps to collect the water and move it to a drain field away from the church building and also the installation of dehumidifiers with the AC unit. We will have to put up with the "calliope" sound of the organ until the humidity problem is solved. Needless to say, this work will be expensive and a further drain on our Building Maintenance and Property Improvement Fund. The bucket is already getting empty!
- We are contacting the city of West Columbia about muddy water from faucets in the Sunday School and kitchen areas.
- Trees along the church's property line are overhanging the playground area causing deterioration of ground cover. A congregational work day is going to be scheduled to address grounds and landscaping issues beyond routine maintenance.
- A recent problem of ants in the kitchen is a reminder that groups using the kitchen and Fellowship Hall need to make sure the areas are clean after use.
- The Stewardship Team is preparing the budget for 2025. Each team needs to submit its budget request for next year no later than September 29.
- The Young Adult Ministry Team wants to know whether we should have Trunk or Treat again this year or try something different.

COMMEMORATION PROFILES

Ruth Nicholson

The Lutheran Church, as part of its worship, celebrates the lives of notable Christians of the past. Our hymnal provides a calendar (pp. 15–17) for us to follow which recognizes these individuals on the anniversary of their deaths.



October 6 William Tyndale, Translator, Martyr (ca. 1494-1536)

Born in Gloucestershire, England, William Tyndale was educated at Oxford and Cambridge. He devoted himself to biblical studies and developed expertise in Greek and Hebrew. Unable to find support at home for translating the Bible into English, Tyndale moved to Germany, where he completed his New Testament translation and had it published in 1525. Influenced by Martin Luther, Tyndale joined the Protestant movement and authored tracts for it while translating other parts of the Bible. He moved to Belgium to refine his New Testament. It was there that he was arrested as a heretic, imprisoned and executed. His revised New Testament served as the basis for subsequent English translations, including the King James and Revised Standard versions.

October 7 Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, Pastor in North America (1711-1787)

Often called the patriarch of Lutheranism in America, Muhlenberg was sent from Germany to America as a missionary to early congregations there. After his arrival in 1742, he spent forty-five years traveling almost constantly to assist fledgling congregations or heal divisions in older ones. He was nominally pastor of a Philadelphia congregation until his death. Muhlenberg established the first Lutheran

synod in America, provided a liturgy that would be used for forty years, and wrote a model constitution that was valuable to the churches of his time. Several of his sons became notable clergymen and statesmen in America.

October 17 Ignatius, Bishop of Antioch, Martyr (died ca. 115)

Ignatius was one of Christianity's early martyrs. Little is known about his life. Thought to be a Syrian by birth, Ignatius served as the second or third bishop of the church at Antioch. Condemned to death by the Roman authorities, he wrote letters to Christian communities in Ephesus, Smyrna, Rome, and several other locales. In these writings he urged unity in love within the church and faithfulness to the Eucharist. His letters are important for insights into the early church's faith and practice. Finally, Ignatius did not ask Rome's Christians to attempt his rescue; he wrote that it was an honor for him to imitate Christ's suffering and death. He was thrown to wild beasts and killed, probably in the Colosseum.

Linda G attended the Saxe Gotha Conference Meeting at St. Stephen/Lexington on Sunday, September 15th. Pastor Ralph Hill welcomed all and noted that our mission—as all mission projects — brought 'comfort to his heart'! He was amazed at what the women are doing in Tanzania. Sharon Shealy and Cathy Milejezak spoke about the 'She Shed Helping Uwanji Women' Global Project in Tanzania and about the South Carolina women and how with help through the SC Synod provided funds totaling some \$100,000 to help purchase the supplies needed to build the shed and a tractor with sixteen attachments. What a blessing this is for these women. Women do all the planting and harvesting of the crops in this country and this tractor will be used by others in the region. Good News-the Clinic is also up and running as of September 15th and is already performing surgeries and has delivered two babies as of this There were 28 present today from eight writing. congregations. Three board members were present — Sarah Cheesman from Leesville (Bethel/White Rock), Lisa Petty from Lexington (Living Springs/Columbia), and Shari Donley from Florence/Cross & Crown.
